JOSÉ ARPA
A SPANISH PAINTER IN TEXAS

On View March 11 - May 28, 2017	Opening Reception Friday, March 17 6 - 8 p.m.	Featured Speaker Michael Grauer
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José Arpa y Perea (1858-1952) opened a studio in San Antonio around 1901 and became an important part of the San Antonio school. Born in Carmona, the son of a cobbler, Arpa began studying part-time at the *Academia des Bellas Artes* (Academy of Fine Arts) in Seville, Spain, in 1876. He became a full-time student by 1878 and from 1882 to 1886 painted in Rome. Returning to Spain in 1886, Arpa sent paintings as part of the Spanish contingent for the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893, where Impressionism was all the rage. He traveled to San Antonio, Texas, in 1899, and exhibited in the San Antonio International Fair in 1900. Arpa met Robert and Julian Onderdonk and divided his time between Mexico, Spain, and San Antonio until 1923, when he founded a painting school in San Antonio. Arpa continued to exhibit frequently at museums and galleries throughout Texas as well as New York and Spain. He won the "Texas Prize" at the Texas Wildflower Exhibition in 1927, and exhibited in the remaining two "Davis Competitions" in 1928 and 1929. Arpa permanently returned to Spain in 1931. This exhibition will be the first major Arpa exhibition since 1998, and is organized by the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon, Texas. A full color catalog published by the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum will be available for sale in the AMSET gift shop. Michael Grauer, Associate Director of Curatorial Affairs, Art and Western Heritage at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, will deliver a gallery talk at the opening reception.

Alison Gaspard lives and works in Houston, Texas, where she is an artist and arts educator. Gaspard graduated with a Bachelor in Fine Arts (BFA) from Lamar University in 2014. Currently, Gaspard works as an art educator for the Houston Independent School District, and is the founder of the Fine Arts Program on her campus (fall 2016). Before moving to Houston, Gaspard was an employee at the Art Museum of Southeast Texas (AMSET), in Beaumont. She credits the development of her style and technique to various sources, including: professors at Lamar University, experiences while studying abroad in Florence, Italy, the staff at AMSET, and, most of all, the inspiration she derives from her students. As an educator, Gaspard is moved by the innocence of the young and their desire to learn.

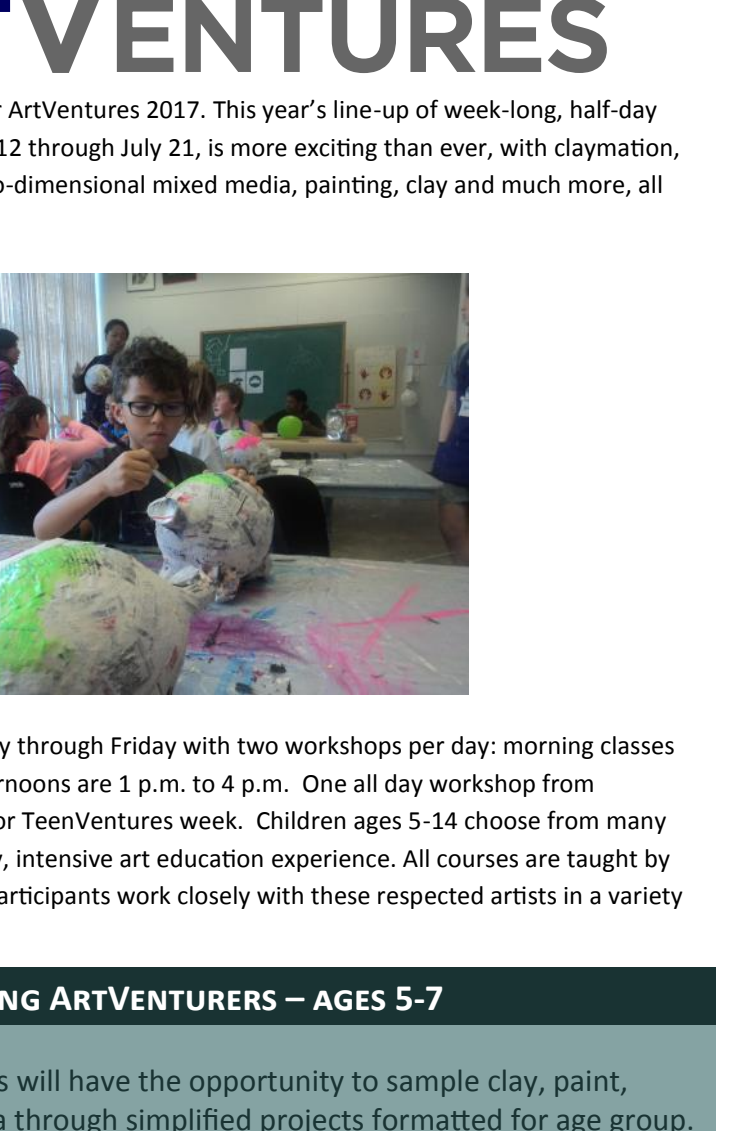
In her Café Arts exhibition, *What Will They Become*, Gaspard visualizes youthful, solitary figures encircled by ambiguous values that have prominence, begin to fade into and simultaneously arise from these indistinct values. These values represent the unknown environmental factors that will affect and alter the figure's development from youthful innocence to adulthood. The vagueness of the settings leads one to doubt the security of their future. This body of work illustrates the power and influence of the environment while it is shaping and molding the enigmatic futures of younger generations.

SHERRY OWENS

Featured Speaker: Artist Sherry Owens

Native Texan and Dallas artist Sherry Owens is renowned for her sculpture made of crepe myrtle tree pieces, simultaneously evoking both the natural and other worldly elements of the tree in her sculptures and installations. Owens often states that she is a recycle artist and fills her studio with branches that would otherwise be discarded. The meticulous quality of her work, which emphasizes the luscious capabilities of line and form as her pieces of crepe myrtle intersect and build, weaving together and activating space, call to mind the artist's early formative years as a weaver. Founded in nature, Owens' art stems away from the natural world giving second life to her found media and pushing our preconceived understanding of the boundaries of wood and form. Although Owens' has exhibited with AMSET in the past in group shows, this will be her first solo exhibition with the museum. Owens received her BFA from Southern Methodist University in 1972, and is a former president of the Texas Sculpture Association. The artist will be present at the opening and will give an artist talk in the gallery with her work.

Let the games begin and come out to support AMSET's exhibitions and programs at *Go for the Gold*, where everyone is a winner.



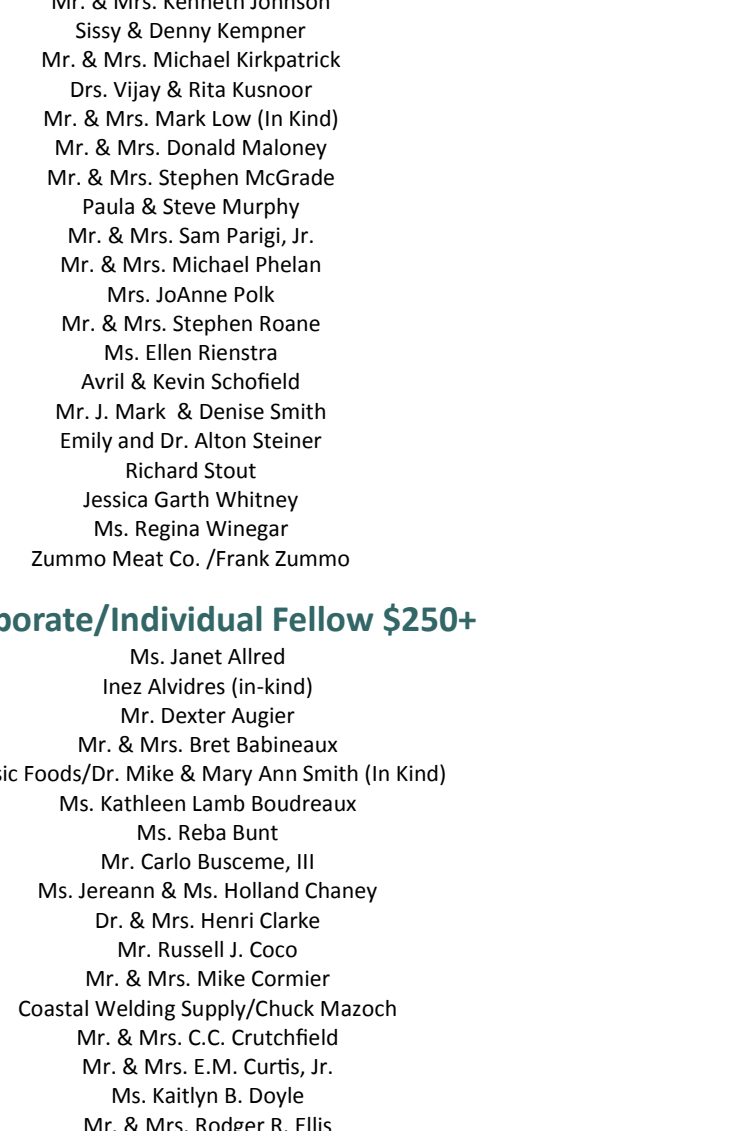

ART VENTURES

Join AMSET for Summer ArtVentures 2017. This year's line-up of week-long, half-day workshops, from June 12 through July 21, is more exciting than ever, with clay, claydram, painted wearables, two-dimensional mixed media, painting, clay and much more, all taught by professional artists.

ArtVentures is offered Monday through Friday with two workshops per day: morning classes are from 9 a.m. to noon; afternoons are 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. One all day workshop from 9 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. is offered for TeenVentures week. Children ages 5-14 choose from many class options for a high quality, intensive art education experience. All courses are taught by professional artists, and the participants work closely with these respected artists in a variety of mediums.

YOUNG ARTVENTURES - AGES 5-7

Young ArtVenturers will have the opportunity to sample clay, paint, pastels and mixed media through simplified projects formatted for age group. Classes will be augmented with story times (using art-related stories) and outdoor activities.

ARTVENTURES - AGES 8-11

ArtVenturers will have exciting courses to choose from including ceramics, painted wearables, mixed media, and even claymation.

TEENVENTURES - AGES 12-14

A special week, July 5-July 7, just for those interested in exploring public art through urban landscape. Teen campers will be introduced to works from artists Banksy, Blek Le Rat, and C215. This week will emphasize the positive influence of street art on urban design while teens create a collaborative piece of public art.

The cost for Summer ArtVentures is \$75 for members, \$135 for non-members for the child's first class, \$75 for each additional child and \$70 for each additional class. The non-member fee includes a one-year family membership. Scholarships are also available.
